PRIVACY POLICY

Thank you for visiting the CASAC Inc site, and reviewing the privacy policy. CASAC Inc is committed to respecting survivor's rights to privacy and confidentiality, and in accordance with website privacy guidelines. This policy tells you how we protect any personal information collected.

What is personal information?

According to the 'Federal Privacy Act 1988', "**personal information**" means information or an opinion (including information or an opinion forming part of a database), whether true or not, and whether **recorded** in a material form or not, about an **individual** whose identity is apparent, or can reasonably be ascertained, from the information or opinion. This does not include information that is available in a public publication.

What information is collected and how do we use it?

Unless you request information or a service, we do not collect personal information. The kinds of information we collect will depend on the services you request from us. We will record your email address and certain other personal information if you choose to send us a message from our website. We will only use the personal information in the email for the purpose for which you have provided it.

When you visit our web site the following information may be gathered to assist us understanding who is interested in our service:

- The type of browser and operating system you use;
- The date and time you access our site;
- The pages you have accessed;
- The previous Internet address from which you linked directly to our site.

Disclosing of Information:

We do not disclose your information to anyone else without your consent; we do not sell email lists. Our web site contains links to other sites, and we are not responsible for the content and the privacy practices of these sites. You should examine each site's privacy policies and make your own decisions regarding the site and the information they contain.

USE OF "COOKIES"

A "cookie" is a piece of information or small file that an Internet web site sends to your browser when you access information at that site. Web sites use a "cookie" for maintaining contact with you while you are in the site. The cookie allows this web site to recognise you as an individual as you move from one page to another and this information is used to gather meaningful statistics about the site's usage and it is analysed to improve the design of the site.
